





### PUBLIC DEFENDER RELEASES INFORMATION TO HELP WITH JOBS, FOOD, HOUSING, PUBLIC BENEFITS, ETC. DURING COVID-19 EMERGENCY

OAKLAND, Calif. - Partners for Justice Advocates with the Public Defender's Office have compiled a list of resources to help low-income residents find help with unemployment, food, housing and other problems during the county's shelter-in-place order.

"This emergency is hitting low income folks the hardest. Even before the virus, many of our clients and their families did not have stable housing nor reliable access to food and good medical care," said Alameda County Public Defender Brendon Woods. "We want to make sure they know some help is available.

Since the beginning of the emergency, the Public Defender has focused on getting people released from Santa Rita County jail. So far, more than 300 people have been released because of the emergency. All jail inmates are at high risk of contracting the virus because they are kept in such close quarters. No immates can engage in the social distancing public health officials have ordered the rest of the populace to practice. Lack of access to hygiene products in the jail, poor sleep and nutrition also are problems.

But as part of its "holistic defense" model, the Public Defender also knows that keeping people out of trouble often means giving them services and help. About five years ago, the Public Defender began hiring a team of social workers to help attorneys with cases and to connect clients with services.

In 2018, Partners for Justice initiated a program to house a team of five college graduates known as PFJ Advocates to partner with Public Defender attorneys and to work directly with clients to prevent incarceration, protect clients from the collateral consequences of criminal justice involvement and connect clients with social services.

Income: Know your rights if you cannot work

### Food: Where to get food for your children and you

All Oakland Unified students and families and any Oakland residents under 18 can pick up free food at OUSD's 12 pick up sites. Hayward Unified provides the same support here, Berkeley schools here. San Leandro Unified here, Fremont here. Anyone, especially those who are unhoused or elderly, can call the Alameda County Food Bank's emergency food helpline. Seniors can also call a Meals on Wheels provider to sign up for food delivered daily -- county providers here.

### Public benefits: How to get and continue aid

Eligible people can still apply for food stamps, GA, CalWorks, and other benefits right now. Our county's social services agency is encouraging phone and online applications -- see here. The governor also issued an executive order allowing safety net programs to continue without nterruption and without need for re-certifications for 90 days.

### victions, foreclosures and utilities

ne Alameda County Sheriff and Alameda County Superior Court have agreed to halt evictions our county. Find an ongoing updated page about eviction policies across the Bay during wid-19 from Bay Legal here. HUD also announced a 60-day moratorium on all evictions and eclosures for single family homeowners with FHA-insured mortgages - see here. And, PG&E plemented a moratorium on service disconnections due to non-payment -- see here.

### Healthcare

Alameda County provides healthcare to low-income people who are not eligible for Medi-Cal (such as undocumented people) through HealthPAC. Also, testing and treatment related to Covid-19 will not be considered in the USCIS public charge test – see here. Resources in Spanish can be found here. Street Level Health Project: Hotline (510)306-4835, open M -F 8:30-5pm and has Mam and Spanish speakers to assist with applying for benefits (including HealthPAC) over the phone and online. They are also able to refer clients to a staff clinician for an over the phone assessment of symptoms and can make referrals to Highland Hospital.

### Mental Health, addiction and homelessness

The county's contracted phone referral services for mental health (ACCESS) and substance use are still running. Alameda County Crisis Support Services offers a 24/7 crisis line.

Mutual Aid (community volunteer support) and crow-sourced resources Disability Justice Culture Club East Bay help form, Oakland high risk matching project-here's a flyer, Bay Area Covid-19 Mass Resource List

Homeless Resources: Alameda County Healthcare for the Homeless Covid-19 guidance includes a phone number to call if someone is unhoused with symptoms. The state has already leased 2 Oakland hotels for high-risk and confirmed coronavirus cases of homeless folks--we're staying updated on this. The Berkeley Free Clinic's Street Medicine Team, East Oakland Collective, and other community orgs are working hard to deliver sanitation stations and food to encampments.

### Oakland towing and parking

The city has suspended enforcement of most parking restrictions, metered parking, and timelimited parking. Most towing has been suspended also--refer here.



- BEFORE Clean Slate: Temp worker because couldn't pass background check
- WHAT Clean Slate DID: Helped him terminate his probation early, dismiss his convictions, and provided employment advocacy
- AFTER Clean Slate: In May 2020, during the pandemic, passed background check and hired as FT permanent employee
- His new role came with a \$2 per hour pay increase, vacation days, sick days, 401k, medical & dental benefits



# IMMIGRATION REPRESENTATION UNIT

Currently representing 90 people in removal proceedings and conducted over 900 Padilla consults.

(Padilla states that criminal defense attorneys must advise noncitizen clients about the deportation risks of a guilty plea.)

Helped stop deportations, vacated convictions that made clients deportable, and successfully challenged statutory and constitutional violations of clients' rights before Federal Courts.



### **Prosperous and Vibrant Economy**

**GOAL:** Continue to secure immigration status for noncitizen clients, helping them secure the right to live and work in the United States and contribute to a prosperous economy.



### **Eliminate Poverty/Hunger**

**GOAL:** Continue to secure immigration status for noncitizen clients, helping them secure the right to live and work in the United States.



### **Crime Free County**

**GOAL:** Continue to connect clients with rehabilitative treatment programs in the course of deportation defense representation to prevent recidivism.



### **Employment for All**

**GOAL:** Continue representing all eligible clients on work permit applications securing rights to work for immigrant clients pending deportation proceedings.





# DIVERSITY ON JURIES

- o 33 trials conducted between Jan. 2020 and Feb 2021
- Obtained jury demographic data from 23 of them
- o 11 of the 23 trials did not have a single Black person on the jury
- o Of the 276 jurors (12 jurors x 23 trials), only 16 were Black
- o 7 Black clients who had trials did not have a single Black person on their jury
