ACFD Governance

- ACFD is a dependent fire district formed under the Fire Protection
 District Law of 1987 and governed by the County Board of
 Supervisors as the Fire District's Board of Directors
- ACFD receives no County general fund revenue, Prop 172 funds, utility user, or business license tax funds
- 12 Member Fire Advisory Commission comprised of 6 Board appointed members and 6 City Council members
- ACFD complies and adheres to established County of Alameda policies and procedures for fiscal, human resources, and programmatic functions




ACFD Governance (cont.)

Allocation Methodology









TOTAL APPROPRIATION BY MAJOR OBJECT



TOTAL REVENUE BY SOURCE



FIRE REVENUE BY SOURCE



FY 2021-22 Year in Review

- Responded to 40,886 incidents in FY 2020-21
- ACRECC processed 306,585 calls in FY 2020-21
- ACFD conducted 9,717 fire inspections
- Completed 2021 Firefighter Recruit Academy with 10 graduates and completed 2020 Recruit Class probationary process with 14 firefighters
- Implemented the COVID-19 Prevention Program and adjusted to COVID-19 related restrictions with regards to use of PPE, Infection Control and proper training and outreach services



FY 2021-22 Year in Review

- Acquired new cardiac monitors for use by Emergency Medical Services in responding to emergency calls
- ❖ In collaboration with Local EMS Agencies (LEMSA) and other local and regional partners, work on 911 EMS Response System alternatives
- Facilitated the design and budget finalization of the Training Facility
- Continue working on the Fire Safety Bond to replace and upgrade outdated fire stations
- Develop a Strategic Business Plan for ACFD, which will guide major projects and initiatives during 2022-2032
- Continued the work of the Diversity and Inclusion committee to facilitate recruitment effort focused on attracting and retaining diverse workforce
