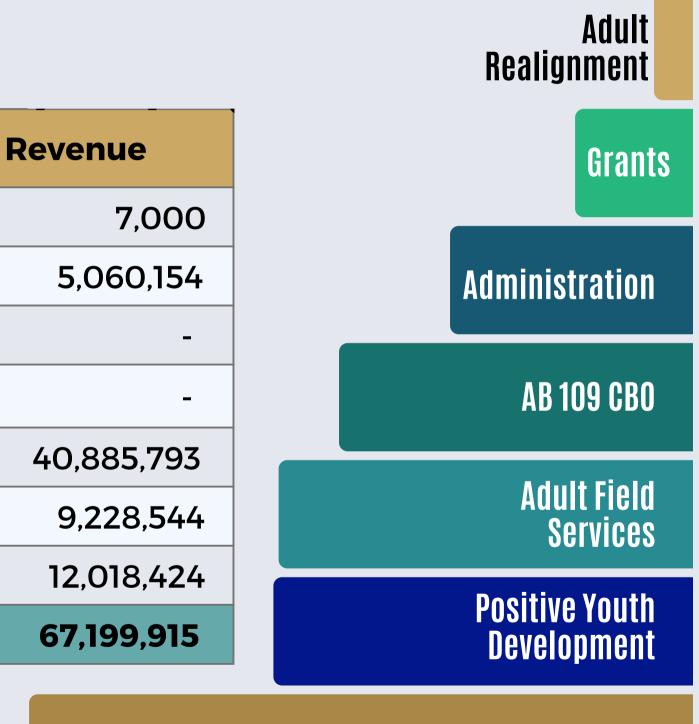

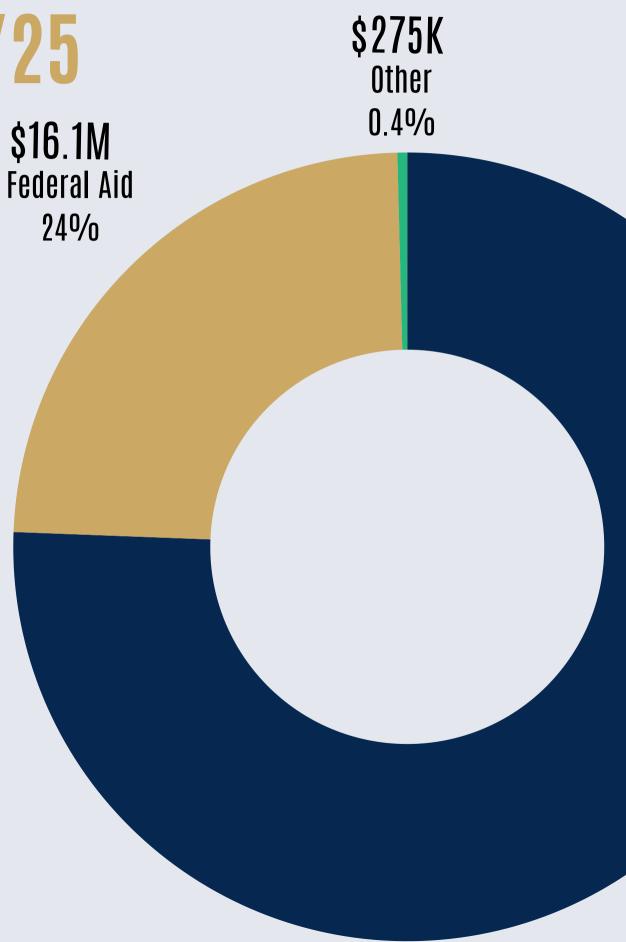

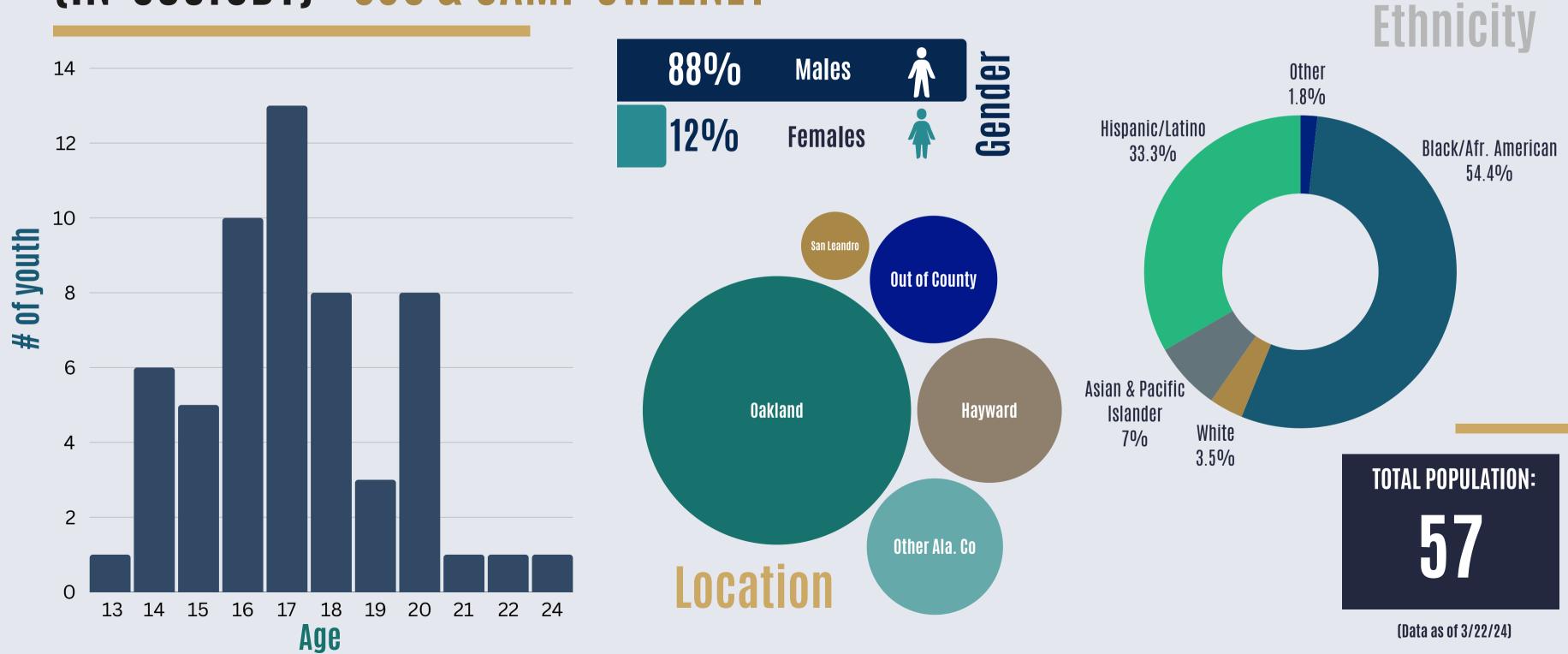

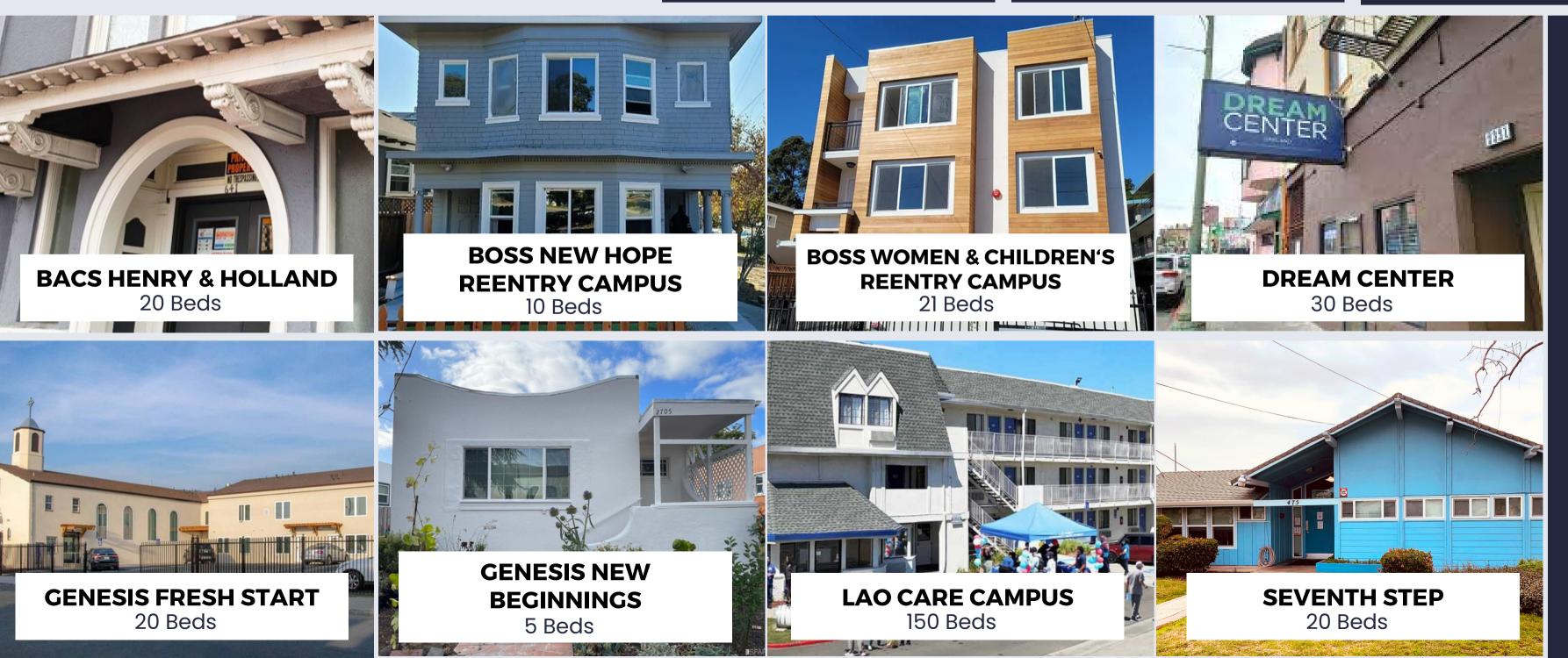

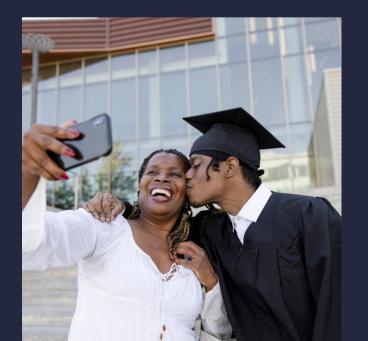

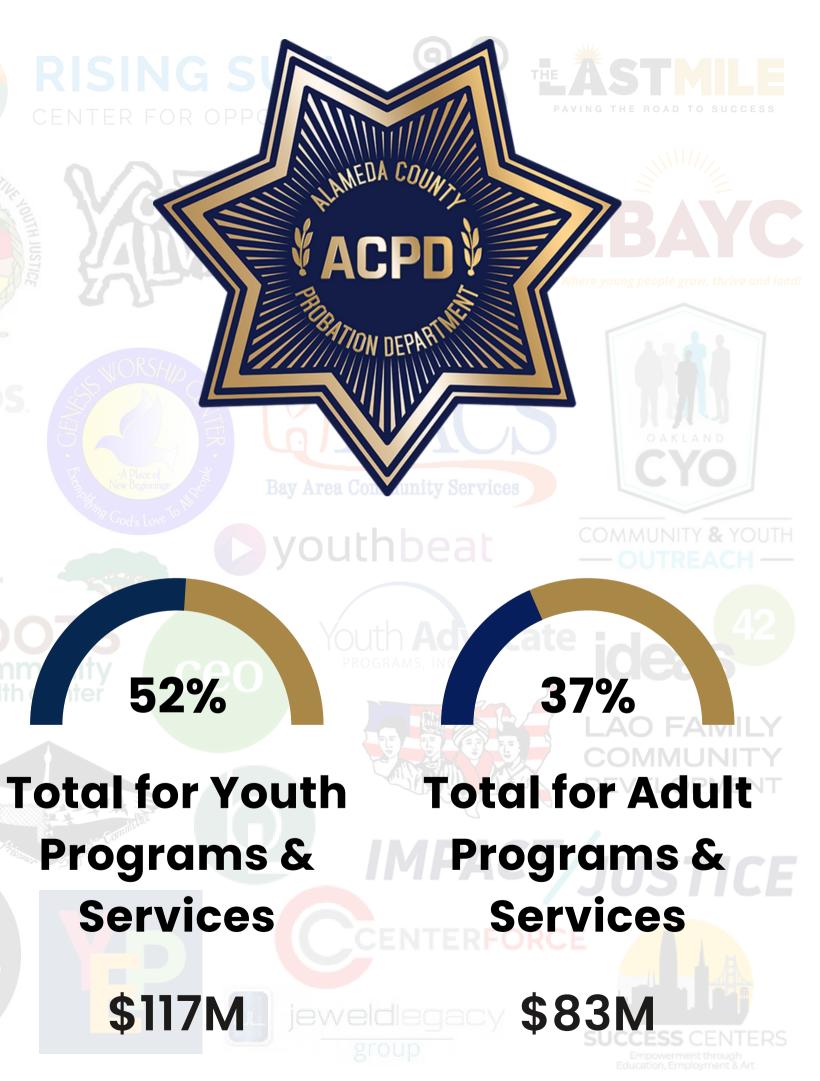

Total Programs & Services Contracts During FY 23/24

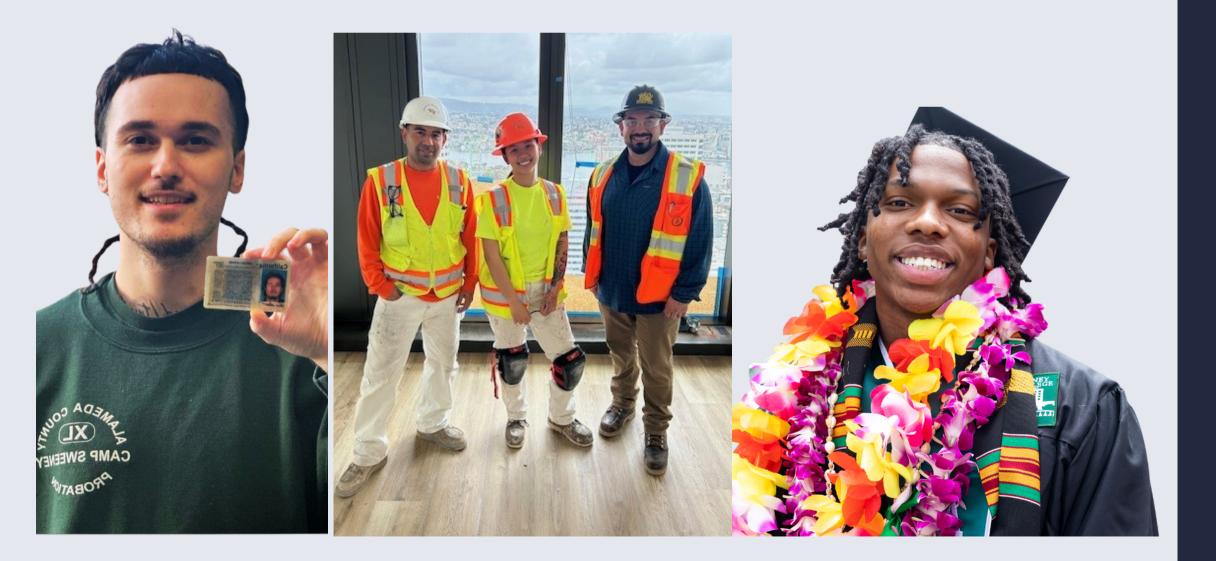
